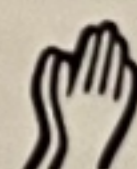

## From the Stake Presidency

Dear Brethren and Sisters:

We trust that each family had a lovely Christmas and an enjoyable holiday season. The beginning of a new year focuses our attention upon new beginnings, new ambitions -- upon resolutions for an even more successful year in 1981.

As your stake presidency we come to you to express a concern which, if given proper attention, will surely result in happier and more productive family life in the Tallahassee Florida Stake.

We have noticed over the last few years the constant pummelling our young people are receiving from worldly influences, and we mourn as we witness many of our Father's precious children fall by the wayside as the caravan of the Kingdom rolls forward. Many of these youth have become involved in worldly matters through innocence, curiosity or experimentation at first, but have fallen prey to satanic devices meant to deceive "the very elect." Like Peter of old, our young people often take their eyes off the Savior or His Church just long enough to notice, and then be trapped by, the engulfing waves of permissiveness beating about them. Such buffeting, if yielded to, eventually leads one to look less and less to the Lord of Life, and finally to sink into a life of misery and unhappiness.

After prayerful consideration of this matter, we feel impressed to address ourselves to all parents within the stake, and to sound a singular "battle cry." It is our feeling that far too often our young people get into difficulties because they are not in the right place at the right time. To you, therefore, we issue the charge to see to it that those under your direction be where they should be at the proper time. Far too few of our youth are attending Primary or Seminary or Young Women's or Young Men's meetings. These are not optional programs. They are required programs, in the sense that our children will not receive the full blessings and benefits of the Church (and thus will not be clothed with the proper armor with which to shield themselves from "the fiery darts of the adversary") if they are missed. In a sense, we cannot "short-circuit" the Lord's machinery and hope to receive a product (our precious children) which is finished and refined and whole. The Church can only be a "defense and a refuge" (D&C 115:6) from the storms beating upon us when we enter into its protective shelter properly, through involving ourselves and our youth in the whole program of the Kingdom of God on earth.

Brothers and sisters, let us not be found wanting in this area. The Lord has not established organizations or programs for our day which are unnecessary. We have need for every part of the Church, and so let us see to it that our young people are involved actively in every phase -- Seminary, Young Men's, Young Women's, Primary, and Sunday School.

May the Lord be with you in the most important work in all the world -- family living. We wish for all the most prosperous and successful new year.

Elder Charles Didier has been a General Authority of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints since October 3, 1975, when he was called to be a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy.

His major assignments include serving as Executive Administrator for the Church in Canada and as a managing director of the Curriculum Department.

He has held supervisory positions in Western Europe, including that of Regional Representative and president of the France-Switzerland Mission.

Elder Didier was born in Ixelles, Belgium, October 5, 1935. A convert to the Church in 1957, he holds a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Liege in Belgium. He has served as an officer in the Belgian Air Force Reserve.

Speaking four languages, he has been employed by the Church as European manager for the Translation and Distribution Department in Frankfurt, Germany.

Elder Didier and his wife, Lucie, are parents of two sons.
