Stake Conference in Review

Saturday Evening Session

President Arnold K. Garr introduced the theme of the conference—making and maintaining ourselves worthy to go to the temple. "The greatest thing we can do in our lives is to go to the temple and keep the covenants we make there for the rest of our lives," President Garr said. He also recounted stories of several people who had to sacrifice much to go to the temple, some who sold their homes and all their possessions. He warned against procrastination, pointing out that the adversary can fulfill his purpose just as well through delay as he can through deceit. "Success," he observed, "is trading what we want now for what we want most. Do not wait for the time to be right; the time will never be just right."

Darlene and Robert Morse, a newly married couple, told of their experience in facing adversity in going to the temple and their testimony that it is worth any price. President John Tanner, Florida Tallahassee Mission President, spoke about the tragic fact that all who are baptized do not remain active and eventually go to the temple. He emphasized the importance of the stake missionaries giving the "Home Teaching Lessons for New Members" to all new converts so that they can make the sometimes difficult transition from their former life to the life of a Latter-day Saint.

Regional Representative James O. Mason spoke about the importance of ward priesthood leaders using the Convert Baptism Checklist. The checklist is to help us help new converts make the transition into active Church membership and nourish them in their progress.

Elder Hartman Rector, Jr., of the First Quorum of Seventy, used an overhead projector, and also called Presidents Tanner and Madsen (Stake Mission President) up to the podium to help him describe things that good member missionaries should do. These are: 1) Pray about missionary work and specific nonmember friends. 2) Invite nonmember friends to a family home evening. 3) Share Church literature and audio visual materials. 4) Invite them to be taught by the missionaries. 5) Invite them to attend Church. 6) Discuss gospel principles and bear testimony.

Sunday Session

President Paul Nicholson conducted the Sunday session and spoke first. He challenged members to do a few things which would improve our great stake: 1) refrain from playing the Florida Lottery. 2) consider the amount of fast offering they give and, where possible, double the amount they are currently paying. 3) pray two times a day for the rest of the year for someone to introduce to the Gospel. 4) read the Book of Mormon before next Stake Conference in September and write a letter to him when finished. 5) go the temple often; get and keep a current temple recommend.

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Stake Presidency Message

Nearly ten years ago President Kimball gave what will probably come to be regarded as his greatest sermon. He stated: "This impression weighs upon me—that the Church is at a point of growth and maturity when we are at last ready to move forward in a major way." He suggested we have paused on some plateaus long enough and pointed out that the following seemingly small efforts could move the Church forward as never before: 1) each active family bring another family or individual into the Church (each year); 2) if only one additional mature couple per ward were called on a full-time mission—our missionary force would nearly be doubled; 3) contemplate the results if each family were to assist (this year) an inactive family or individual into full activity; 4) think of the blessings here and on the other side of the veil if each temple recommend holder were to do just one more endowment this year; 5) do just one more quiet act of Christian service for non-member friends and neighbors regardless of whether they are interested in the Church; and 6) imagine how much richer our family life would be if our spouses and children were to receive a few more minutes of individual attention each month!

President Kimball said it seemed to him that basically there were two major causes for holding back: first, sin which results in disinterest or immobilization and guilt, and, second, reluctance of good members to stretch just a little bit more in this service or in being too shy about letting their light shine. He said it is time for us all to take those seemingly small steps forward which, when compounded, mean major progress for the Church.

Our success, individually and as a church, will largely be determined by how faithfully we focus on living the gospel in the home. Let us "be of good cheer", for the Lord will lead us along and show us the way. President Kimball made the following profound observations: 1) we will move faster if we hurry less; 2) we will make more real progress if we focus on the fundamentals; and 3) we will even come to know more as we serve more, for as we learn to bear more, we are made ready to hear more.

Are you ready to move forward and upward with the Church? We say to you: believe you can, make the sacrifice, and expect the miracle.





Dedicated in Moultrie

Over two-hundred people were in attendance at the Moultrie Branch meetinghouse dedication services held Sunday evening, February 28, with Elder Hartman Rector Jr. presiding. Recent fair weather had brought an early spring look to the beautifully landscaped meetinghouse grounds. The new church, located just off South Main Street on West Boulevard, is in one of the most beautiful sections of Moultrie.

Branch President Tim Burnett conducted and spoke first. He recalled the time of the first commitment to build a new meetinghouse in Moultrie and the seemingly impossible odds that have been overcome since then. He commended the members for their sacrifice and dedication to the effort and expressed his hope that that same support would be shown in a renewed missionary effort as well as reactivation of the less active.

Moultrie branch historian, Edris Parrish, recounted the local church's beginnings from the conversion of her parents, Lincoln and Mildred Barlow, and grandmother, Maryetta Dunn, who had met the missionaries in 1941. Missionaries Ferrell Bell and Don Keith White taught Grandma Dunn, Brother and Sister Barlow, (Aunt) Ruby Powell, and her son Hugh Pierce, and baptized them May 24, 1942.

Traveling missionaries came through the area only occasionally in those war years so the Barlows were prompted to move to Savannah, Georgia where a branch of the church was already organized. After a year "in training" at the Savannah branch, the Barlows again obeyed the promptings of the Holy Spirit, left "good jobs" in Savannah and moved back to Moultrie.

South Georgia district president Bert S. Taylor and his clerk Brother Virgil Griner, of Quitman, met in the Barlow's home in August, 1944 and officially organized the Moultrie Branch under the Southern States Mission. Brother Barlow was called as branch president.

Meetings were held in the Barlow's home until the use of a barracks building was obtained at the Spence Field Air Base just outside Moultrie. The post Korean War closing of the base made it necessary to find another meetinghouse. Thanks to strong early converts Robert Thornton, Fred Bell, Ernest Powell, J.T. Reynolds, Edgar Ricks, and a host of others, the church was able to obtain land, and, hiring Brother Thornton as contractor, built the first Moultrie Branch meetinghouse, completing and dedicating it in 1955.

Tears filled the eyes of most of those assembled as Sister Parrish noted the long list of branch presidents who have served in Moultrie. "We have truly been blessed with outstanding, honorable leaders throughout our history," she said.

President W. Paul Nicholson spoke about "country saints." He paralleled the history of the church in Moultrie with the history of the church in the South.

Elder Hartman Rector, Jr. was concluding speaker. He noted that Moultrie's current membership is about 1% of the population of the Moultrie area. This is approximately the same percentage of Church membership relative to the population of the world. He said that being

such a "little flock" should not concern us. We should take confidence in the fact that this church is one of the fastest growing churches in the South.

Elder Rector exhorted the Moultrie saints to let their next goal be the addition of the full chapel to the new meetinghouse. He urged members to be valiant in their missionary efforts and always be ready to share the great blessings of the Gospel with friends, relatives, and everyone with whom they come in contact. He gave his assurance that the blessings of heaven would continue in great abundance as members were faithful in these endeavors.

Elder Rector concluded by offering the dedicatory prayer. He pronounced Heavenly Father's blessing upon all who entered that they would feel the Holy Spirit, be strengthened and uplifted, and come to know that this is truly the Lord's church.

Next the congregation heard two new Church members relate their conversion stories. Edwin Granger of the Tallahassee First Ward, a former Catholic Priest and missionary in Africa, told of his search for truth and eventual conversion to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints through the Book of Mormon given him by a friend. The events that ensued forced him to eventually leave his family, home, and possessions and move to Tallahassee. Jim Fishback of the Tallahassee Third Ward spoke of balance and contrasts, comparing his current faith with the lack of faith he had seven years ago when his wife was near death and he was angry at God.

President Loran Anderson spoke of the importance of returning to the Lord the ten percent He has asked and related several stories about faithfulness in tithing paying. One scripture which was quoted several times in the conference was Luke 6:38—"Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again."

President Tanner told of his belief that when we raised our hands in the pre-earth council to sustain our Heavenly Father's plan, part of that plan was that if we received the Gospel we would take it to the others. He suggested that simply asking people if they like to read was a good way to give someone a copy of the Book of Mormon.

Elder Mason related how at one time he and Elder Rector had lived in the same ward and that Elder Rector was his family's home teacher. He noted that in spite of the busy schedule, Elder Rector never missed a month in coming to bless the lives of the Mason family. Elder Mason bore witness of the reality of President Nicholson's call from the Lord to preside over this stake and bore his testimony of the reality of Jesus Christ as our Savior.

Elder Rector spoke mostly on the Book of Mormon and said that the Book of Mormon was given to us to bear witness of Christ. Moroni wrote the title page to the book and named the book after his father, Mormon. The Book of Mormon restores the plain and precious things which have been removed over time from the Bible. "The Bible does not explain many doctrines," he said. "For example, the Bible clearly states the need to be baptized, but it does not explain how to be baptized. The Book of Mormon makes it perfectly clear." Elder Rector also spoke of Satan's commonly used lies, such as: "One time won't hurt," "Everybody is doing it," "It doesn't get any better," and, "No one else will ever know." Many of these lies, he pointed out, are used in T.V. commercials. Elder Rector also emphasized the importance of raising the Lord's children. "Raising children is unpopular today," he observed. "The only consideration in limiting your family should be the emotional and physical health of the mother. It is not a financial consideration, or one dependent on education or convenience. It has been prophesied that the day would come when none but the Latter-day Saint women would be willing to have children. That probably sounded pretty ridiculous at the time—but that day is upon us." Lastly, to the delight of the congregation, Elder Rector sang a song about a young man with leprosy who met the Master, was healed by him, and followed him to his death.


