The counsel we receive from Church leaders provides guidelines so that we may enjoy happiness in our everyday lives. The following excerpts were taken from the April General Conference talks.



PERSONAL GROWTH

Some years ago the Church distributed a pamphlet entitled "What Kind of Hometeacher Are You?". It asked you to grade yourself as a hometeacher, giving the choice of poor, good, fair, and excellent. It went on to say that if you are making your hometeaching visits at all, you should not grade yourself very low. The fact that you are trying puts you on the ladder with a top rung of "Excellent," and what is important is not that you are at the top of the ladder, but just the fact that you are on the ladder headed in an upward direction.

In all phases of the Gospel we need to be concerned with our personal progress and the progress of our family. What is important here is that we are moving ahead and can see some progress. The Gospel is designed to make bad people good and good people better. We need to start at whatever level we find ourselves.

The Lord has always accomplished His work with imperfect people for the simple reason that He has no perfect people to work with. Some are just more imperfect than others. So many times we want to give ourselves a grade of "poor" when we analyze our shortcomings. This often makes us depressed and frustrated and interferes with our desire to pray and study. It can put a barrier between us and our Heavenly Father. We should not fall into this trap. Satan works best with people who are depressed. He loves for us to dwell on the negative aspects of our character.

We need to keep in mind the progress we have made, no matter how slow it seems in coming. It is only when we stop trying to live the Gospel that we should grade ourselves as "poor." As long as you are trying, give yourself a grade of "Excellent."

Members Receive Stake Callings

In this capacity he plans to provide a wide variety of activities that are important to the members of our Stake. Although Brother Kerns expressed surprise at receiving this calling, he knows it is one that will provide himself as well as others many opportunities to grow.



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Brother Carlos Deason of the Quincy Ward has received a call to be a member of the Stake High Council. A life-long member of the Church, Brother Deason is a native of this area where he and his wife, Ivaleen, have raised three sons. Brother Deason comes well qualified to this position.

His past church callings include Branch President of the Quincy Branch, First Counselor in the Quincy Ward Bishopric, Counselor to the Stake President, member of the District Presidency, and he has formerly served as a High Council representative.

In his new calling, Brother Deason will act as High Council Representative to the Bainbridge Branch, serve on the Melchizedek Priesthood and Welfare Committees, and act as advisor for the Stake Single Adult program. In fulfilling these responsibilities,

Brother Garr worked with the youth a lot in his calling as Bishop of the Palmyra Ward six years ago and when he recently served on the Aaronic Priesthood Committee.

While serving in this calling, Brother Garr hopes to add greater meaning to the quarterly stake auxiliary meetings, to build attendance, and to introduce Young Men and Scouting programs in areas that don't now have them.



New Unit Leaders Called

A new bishop and three new branch presidents have been called to serve in the Stake. The word bishop means overseer, and "the power and right of selecting and calling . . . Bishops is vested in the First Presidency. . . ." (John Taylor Items on Priesthood, p. 32). The duties of a branch president are comparable to those of a bishop.

"The Lord has so organized His Church that there is accessible to every member . . . a spiritual advisor, and a temporal counselor as well, who knows them intimately and who knows the circumstances and conditions out of which their problems come, and who, by reason of his ordination, is entitled to an endowment from our Heavenly Father of the necessary discernment and inspiration of the Lord to enable him to give . . . advice. . . . We refer to the Bishop or Branch President." (First Presidency, letter to members, Jan. 29, 1973.) "The average bishop gives all his time and efforts for the betterment of the people over whom he presides." (Joseph F. Smith, Gospel Doctrine, p. 188.) There is no position in the Church that will bring a greater blessing to any man than the office of a bishop if he will honor that office and be a real father to the flock over whom he is called to preside. . . . If he has done his duty as a bishop, he has been hand in hand with the Father of us all, and everything that he has done to bless his kind is laid up as a treasure in heaven and nobody can take the blessing from him." (George Albert Smith, Conference Report, October 1948, pp. 186-87.)

MADISON

Rex Taylor has been enjoying his calling as branch president in Madison. His family was introduced to the gospel in Arizona where they lived prior to coming to Florida in 1970. "Sandy [my wife] would have joined the Church then," he remarked, "but she wanted to wait for me."

They were baptized together in 1976. Brother Taylor later had the honor of baptizing his two oldest children, Jackie, now 17, and John, 14, on John's 8th birthday. Jackie's desire to join was an influence in bringing the family into the Church. Brother Taylor, a salesman for a large restaurant supply house, admits he did not fulfill his Church callings with "all the energy of heart" at first. "In every instance there were others far more qualified than I was, but the callings I have received have been for my own growth and benefit." He has served as ward clerk, cub scout master, Gospel Doctrine teacher, and stake and ward executive secretary before being called on the High Council in 1979. He has always loved people, but he feels that his association with the Stake Presidency while working as executive secretary to President Madsen mellowed his sometimes "sharp exterior."

There are three things President Taylor would like to teach in Madison: (1) ". . . love one another, as I have loved you. . . . By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." (John 13:34-35.) As individuals with given talents, we can do certain things; together we can do all things. (2) A focus on the three-fold mission of the Church (preach the gospel, perfect the saints, redeem our dead). We are all striving to reach the celestial kingdom; let us work together. (3) "Let each man learn his duty" (D&C 107:99), not anyone else's.

President Taylor said the people in Madison are a

"great group of individuals" and "will do anything you ask them to." Some excellent examples of this are those men he has worked closest with: his counselors Joe Robinson and Dale Kinard, the branch clerk and assistant branch clerk David Taylor and Fred Williamson, and executive secretary Pat Lightcap. President Taylor expressed his sincere love for the members in Madison and appreciation for the cooperation they have shown.

CRAWFORDVILLE



Robert Little moved to the Tallahassee area in 1971 from central Florida and was converted to the Church in 1973. Job opportunities in construction (or the lack of them) took him to Alaska with his family where they have lived for the past two years. His wife, Ann, probably would not admit to liking cold weather, but President

Little says his family loves Alaska. They have a son, Joseph, who is 9, and a daughter, Mindy, age 5. They came back to Crawfordville to spend some time with a special aunt who is very ill with cancer, but evidently the Lord had more reason to bring Brother Little back to this area than he anticipated.

He was a bit surprised when called as branch president in Crawfordville, but President Little has a strong and decisive manner. He likes to "take the bull by the horns" and get right to work in whatever he attempts. He feels strongly about the need for reactivation, missionary work, and improved home teaching [and visiting teaching] in Crawfordville and further stated, "Youth is a priority with me. It always has been. I want to see more from our youth. I want them to be more involved." He added that it won't be long before the responsibility of leading the Church is placed upon our youth, and they need to be gaining experience for this now.

President Little has two fine counselors in Don Brock and Stan Tucker. Assisting the branch presidency are Bill Wasdin, branch clerk, and Bill Hunter, executive secretary.

Brother Little plans to return to Alaska when his "work" here is finished.

STUDENT WARD

Jack Hall was born in El Paso, Texas, and being in a military family, lived in several places before settling in Tallahassee almost 20 years ago. He attended high school in California where he served as senior class president, varsity club president, and most outstanding senior, as well as quarterback in football and both pitcher and second baseman in baseball. A four-year scholarship to the University of Southern California followed, but his hopeful pro-baseball career was cut short due to a shoulder injury in his sophomore year.



As a young boy Brother Hall had many interactions with the Church through scouting and athletics. He later joined the Church while in the Air Force in South Carolina, where he also met his wife, Linda. They have four daughters: Keri, Sheri, and Lori, who are married and raising families of



their own, and Jacki, age 16, a Laurel in the Tallahassee First Ward. He has a successful insurance business, and attributes some of that success to leadership training and experience in public speaking in the Church. He has served three times previously as a branch president.

As bishop of the Student Ward, Brother Hall's areas of emphasis are the home and visiting teaching programs as well as self-motivation. Max Sweat, who also served previously on the High Council, is serving as first counselor in the bishopric with Toby Nixon as clerk and Mitchell Akins as executive secretary. In his short experience in the Ward thus far, he commends the members for following through on assignments given and for their willingness to accept any calling, no matter how great or small. He stated that the Student Ward is perhaps the most exciting unit in the Stake to serve in because of the enthusiasm of the young congregation.

"Pat knew I was going to be called as branch president in Perry. When she told me, I said they wouldn't do that because I have to work every other Sunday."

Conrad Futch, who is well-known throughout the Stake for driving the bus for all the temple excursions and for telling jokes while traveling to and from the

temple, was being prepared. From the time they joined the Church in Marianna in February 1966, Brother Futch has served in many leadership capacities, including counselor in the Elder's Quorum, Elder's Quorum president, and High Priest Group Leader before being called as a member of the High Council nearly four years ago. Brother Futch is well-seasoned in many areas. He and his wife, Pat, have been married for 23 years. They came to Tallahassee 11 years ago when transferred with Greyhound, where he has worked for over 20 years. The Futches have six children including two they have adopted: Diane, who is married and expecting her third child; Melody, a student at BYU and hobbyist in photography; twin boys - Ken, who will soon be leaving on a mission, and Kevin, an employee at a nearby McDonalds; Shawn, a video game enthusiast; and Randy, notorious around the house for knowing where everything is.

President Futch has received a warm welcome in Perry and stated that he is not looking for a great deal of change in the branch but hopes to see growth during the time he serves with the members there. "They used to average about 70 people in Sacrament Meeting," he said. "I'd like to see that again." This reactivation process will come through an increase in spirituality and love and the development of greater unity in the branch, according to President Futch.

One of the things we should be most grateful for in our lives is the scriptures. The standard works should be a source of light for everyone. The following are helps from the scriptures for solving everyday problems. These thoughts are taken from a Family Home Evening Manual published in the 1970's.

Scripture messages that give hope and encouragement when you are discouraged, fearful or worried: "Fear thou not, for I am with thee," Isaiah 41:10, 13; "Love casteth out fear," 1 John 4:18; "The Lord giveth no commandments...save he shall prepare a way..." 1 Nephi 3:7.

Scripture messages that give comfort when you are sorrowing because of sins you have committed: "Your sins...shall be white as snow," Isaiah 1:18; "I...remember them [sins] no more," D&C 58:42; "I...suffered...that they might not suffer," D&C 19:16.

Scripture messages that will guide you when someone has wronged you or been unkind: "A soft answer turneth away wrath," Proverbs 15:1-2; "Love your enemies..." Luke 6:27-30; The golden rule, Luke 6:31.

Scripture messages that teach the importance of loving and serving others, and that will help build good relationships with other people: "He who loveth God loves his brother also," 1 John 4:20-21; "Act only with love unfeigned," D&C 121:41-43; "Charity is the pure love of Christ," Moroni 7:46-48; "As ye have done it unto the least of these...ye have done it unto me," Matthew 25:31-46; "Without love, I am nothing," 1 Corinthians 13.

Scripture messages that give comfort when you are weighed down with troubles: "Whom I love I also chasten," D&C 95:1; "After tribulation come the blessings," D&C 58:2-4; "These things shall give thee experience and shall be for thy good," D&C 122:7; "Tribulation worketh patience," Romans 5:1-5.

These are only a few examples of how scriptures can help each person to meet the problems that occur in his everyday life. Virtually every page of every book contains such messages. It is our prayer that this message will be of help to you. May we all count our many blessings and be thankful for our lives and the gospel of Jesus Christ. We love you and care very much about you!

NEW WARD IN TALLAHASSEE

A combined Tallahassee First and Second Ward Sacrament meeting was held Sunday, September 4, to announce the creation of the new Tallahassee Third Ward and the reorganization of ward boundaries. This change was approved by the Church's Boundary Committee under the direction of Elder Marvin J. Ashton of the Quorum of the Twelve and by the First Presidency. The action was sustained unanimously by those in attendance Sunday.

"It was a matter of size," explained President Richard Chapple. "As a congregation grows in numbers it is increasingly difficult for a leader to serve them effectively. Dividing into smaller units has some nice side effects, too, like increasing potential for growth and giving more people an opportunity to serve in Church offices." President Chapple later noted that when he first came to the Tallahassee area in 1971 there were 275 members. In 1975 there were 650, and currently there are 1,350 members. Four wards and two branches now serve that same geographic area originally served by one "Tallahassee Branch."

The bishops of the First and Second Wards, Bill Miller and Leslie Williams, each bore their testimonies and reflected on the growth they have witnessed in the Church in the Tallahassee area, including the formation of the Crawfordville and Monticello Branches. Don Whitley, called as bishop of the new Third Ward, was excited as he spoke of the significance of this special event. The Stake Presidency discussed the increased potential for growth, both individually and as a stake. It was interesting to note that all three of the Tallahassee bishops are converts to the Church, and it was pointed out that as members pull together and work to achieve common goals, numbers will multiply. New friends will be made, and our love for old friends will not change even though we may not see them as often. There will be greater opportunities for missionary work and reactivation as members participate more fully.

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Donald M. Whitley, II, bishop of the new Tallahassee Third Ward, says he is "excited and humbled" by his new calling -- excited about the opportunity to serve the members of the ward as their bishop, and humbled by the big responsibility of "putting a ward together."

In the early 1970s, the Whitleys had a neighbor who was the branch president in Boone, North Carolina where they lived. The missionaries there were required to spend a certain amount of time each week with non-members to keep the area open for full-time missionary work. The branch president asked his neighbors to help out by having the missionaries over, and the Whitleys agreed. Little did they know that this small kindness would eventually have such a great return! They talked with many missionaries after that, and Marion joined the Church first in 1974; Don followed a year later.


Small branches are good places to serve and grow, as Brother Whitley learned when he was called as a counselor in a Sunday School presidency before he was baptized. Since that time he has also served as an assistant clerk, teachers quorum advisor, first counselor in a branch presidency, and branch president. When Brother Whitley was offered a position at the Anneewakee Treatment Center two and a half years ago, the family moved to the Tallahassee area from Montana and he was called as branch president in Crawfordville. Most recently he served as Ward Mission Leader in the Tallahassee Second Ward in conjunction with his calling as one of the Seven Presidents of Seventy in the Stake.

All these things have combined to give the new bishop a real enthusiasm for missionary work. When asked about goals, Bishop Whitley stated simply that he would like to "see us divide again." This growth will come as "we do what we've been asked to do" by our prophet and Church leaders in living the principles of the gospel. He emphasized the mission of the Church, pointing out that the first step is missionary work -- "preaching the gospel." He would like to see families grow stronger and closer together, and he believes this will be the basis for much success that will follow.



Youth Temple Trip

On Monday, July 11, two overloaded Greyhound buses left the Tallahassee Stake Center parking lot bound for Atlanta, Georgia with 117 youth and chaperones to do baptismal work in the new Atlanta Temple. The entire Stake Presidency as well as the Stake Young Men's and Young Women's Presidents, Jim Dame and Maureen Webb, attended the trip.

After arriving late Monday afternoon at the Executive Villas Hotel, everyone hurriedly changed clothes to attend the traditional testimony meeting where there was a great spiritual feast as many of the stake's young men and women bore their testimonies.

Tuesday morning came early with the youth anticipating a great experience in the temple and also looking forward to visiting Six Flags Over Georgia. A tremendous work was done in the temple with 525 male and 560 female baptisms and confirmations being completed. The baptisms took more time than was anticipated, but the temple workers said our session went more smoothly than many others that involved fewer youth. This was a tribute to the youth as well as to the stake leaders.

Six Flags was a fun time for all. Thunder River soaked everyone to the bone and Sister Webb, President Madsen and President Nicholson were buried under a wall of water on the Log Jamboree. There were several rides that only the bravest of souls dare try. President Madsen, who has molded and reshaped minds for years, had his mind "bent" twice on the Mindbender ride.

Before departing for home on Wednesday, the youth visited the Atlanta Cyclorama which is a 360° mural depicting the Battle of Atlanta during the conclusion of the Civil War.

Youth from three stakes begin to assemble for special Youth Conference.



Young Women




Young Women's President, Tallahassee I






Student Ward Auction and Dime-A-Dip Dinner

President Kimball has said that Institute courses "should be given preferential attention" over the college course. He has also said that we should emphasize "the study of the scriptures ahead of the study of the man-written texts; the association with the Church more important than clubs, fraternities, and sororities..." Don't let this overwhelm you! President Kimball reminds us that "one need not choose between the two but only as to the sequence, for there is opportunity for one to get both simultaneously...."

What is Institute? Many people are surprised to find out that it is not just an evening religion class for adults. The primary purpose of Institute is to provide weekday religious instruction for college students and young adults. Therefore, the Church constructs Institute buildings adjacent to college campuses. Non-college adults of all ages are also welcome and encouraged to attend Institute, but the major thrust of the program is directed to college students and young adults.

Brother Garr, the Church Educational System Coordinator for this area, has his own personal feelings about the Institute program: "I have a firm conviction of the vital importance of daily scripture study. I believe that Institute does more to fortify and enrich our personal study of the scriptures than any other program. It is so gratifying to see a person grow and develop spiritually after he has applied a gospel principle in his life."

I am constantly amazed at all that I have learned in the past and at all I continue to learn by attending Institute classes. Not long ago a friend remarked that he was just amazed at the amount of knowledge I have attained for a convert of only three years. Indeed, it has been the "saving grace" many times in contending with the false and worldly views and ideas of higher education. My faith and testimony have been put to the test countless times, but I have remained firm and steadfast because of principles learned at Institute. It has been a very enjoyable opportunity to gain an education by the gift of the Spirit. Basically, it is the Lord's educational system. I cannot see telling Him I didn't have time to take His religion classes.

In conclusion, President Kimball has said, "Weekday religious training is in a position to do as much as any instructional program in the Church to assist the home in directly helping [members] achieve eternal life."

Bulletin

The following statement on missionary work was issued by the First Presidency on 1 October 1982 and was printed in the June 1983 BULLETIN:

"We are commissioned of the Lord 'to preach the gospel to every nation, kindred, tongue, and people.' It is essential that we press forward with missionary zeal to build the kingdom of God on earth. We feel that this upward step can be achieved:

"a. By centering our lives and work around the Savior. Keep in mind that this is the Church of Jesus Christ; please emphasize that fact in making contacts with others. The Lord revealed that the Church should bear the name THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST OF LATTER-DAY SAINTS, 'for thus shall my Church be called in the last days' (D&C 115:4). We feel that some may be misled by the too frequent use of the term 'Mormon Church'. We should talk, rejoice, and preach of Christ; and, we should assist others in understanding the source to which 'they may look for a remission of their sins' (2 Nephi 25:26). Christian living and service should support our verbal expressions of testimony.

"b. By gathering in a greater harvest of convert baptisms. Please follow approved proselyting policies and programs and strengthen the Church. Move with renewed effort and determination. Several scriptural accounts tell of success in converting large numbers of people who became established firmly in the faith. The adding of worthy men to the Melchizedek Priesthood ranks should receive special emphasis.

"c. By inspiring members to engage in missionary service. Please understand that there is a pressing and continuing need for more worthy full-time missionaries and missionary couples, for more participation of members in friendshipping and fellowshipping activities at home, and for a more vigorous stake mission program.

"Through a renewed emphasis and use of the revealed name of the Church--THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST OF LATTER-DAY SAINTS--it will grow and prosper worldwide. Through added member activity in missionary services, a greater harvest of worthy convert baptisms will be realized."

Two new books which are growing in popularity among the members in our Stake are Reflections of a Scientist and The Divine Center.


Reflections of a Scientist, by Henry Eyring. Deseret Book, \$6.95.

This book contains observations on various aspects of science, religion and life.
